# KY THEATRE ORGAN RESTORATION PROJECT

The Bluegrass ATOS Chapter's project to restore the Kentucky Theater's Wurlitzer theatre organ (Opus 562) is making great progress. Chapter members have participated in weekly work sessions and their efforts are visible in the accomplishments that have been made.

Members who have worked with project leader Tim Jones on the project include Brian Hunt, Garry Marsh, Scott Marsh, Dana Ross, Lynn Vera and Pedro Vera.

#### **WIND CHESTS:**

The current activities are focused on the two wind chests, the five rank and the three rank, which will comprise the initial configuration of the organ. (After it is installed in its new home, a future task will be to complete the additional six ranks to bring it up to the organ's historical 3/14 configuration).

The old components of the two wind chests were removed. (much of the old leather had deteriorated). The chests themselves were broken down into their indivdual cabinet boards which were then resurfaced and finished to look better than new. Over 530 new secondary valves were individually positioned and glued into place. Then the spring rails were given a new felt cushion and installed. The three rank cabinet chest has been re-assembled and is ready for the top boards (which were previously completed) to be attached. Work is proceeding to complete the re-assembly of the five rank chest cabinet.

The next phase of the project has two focus areas. First we are cutting the leather for the wind chest gaskets and installing them on the cabinet shells. The second and larger effort is to restore the bottom boards. This involves removing the magnet assemblies and the old primary pneumatic valves. The old primaries have essentially disintegrated over time. Most of the hardware from the bottom boards will be reused. For instance,

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# DR. LANDON DONATES PART OF HIS COLLECTION TO THE ATOS ARCHIVES

Among his many accomplishments, Bluegrass chapter historian Dr. John Landon has accumulated what could easily be the most extensive collection of theatre organ music in existence. He has recordings in multiple formats from the early cylinders to thick vinyl, 78's, 45's and CD's.

Dr. Landon grew up in the late 30's and 40's on a farm in the thumb area of Michigan, north of Detroit and east of Saginaw. There was a lot of theatre organ music available on the radio in those days and Dr. Landon spent many an evening listening to Billy Geyer on WFDF in Flint, Dick Liebert at the Radio City Music Hall, the Moon River show on WLW in Cincinnati and any radio program which used theatre organ music for their opening or closing.

One summer he started off on his bicycle with its wire basket and went from farm to farm asking if any of them had any records they didn't want anymore. Surprisingly he found that many of those households were glad to get rid of their old records. All of them were 78 RPM LP's as 33

1/3 and 45's had not yet come into being.

He got a lot of records, but very few of them were theatre organ records. Although they were few in number, they proved to be the start of his collection. The first record he acquired going from house to house and farm to farm was that of an organist named Harry Chrysler "When Your Hair Has Turned to Silver/I'm Alone Because I love You". Years later he discovered Harry Chrysler was a pseudonym for George Epstein who

recorded for several companies under a variety of false names.

Dr. Landon continued to collect theatre organ music in all formats and today his collection numbers in the thousands of discs. He literally has a room in his house completely occupied with theatre organ music and there are theatre organ records, discs and music tucked away in every nook and cranny throughout the rest of the house.

The time has come, however, to transfer a part of this collection to the ATOS national archive.

On September 27, 2023, Bill Gelhaus, National ATOS Board member and Archivist (among his many duties) made a visit to Dr. Landon. Along

with help from William Webber, Brian Hunt, Tim Jones and Dana Ross, a great deal of his collection of 78 RPM records was loaded up for Bill to transport to the ATOS archives.

Dr. Landon has always been an advocate for preserving the history of theatre organs and the organists who played them. Archives are witnesses to the past. They preserve the history as a basic function. They also enable education, research and entertainment to people who want to know more about this grand musical instrument. This donation will ensure that his collection will continue to be available for many generations to come and that it will continue to to benefit everyone who seeks out the majestic story of the theatre organ.

### TIM BAKER and THE PHANTOM OF THE OPERA

On Friday the 13th, 2023, the audience at the Kentucky Theatre was thrilled with the showing of "The Phantom of the Opera" accompanied by Tim Baker on the theatre organ.

This 1925 silent film starring Lon Chaney and Mary Philbin is a classic horror film which remains famous for Chaney's ghastly, self devised make-up which was kept a studio secret until the film's premiere.

This event took the audience back in time to experience the movie as movie goers saw it when it first came out on September 6, 1925.

The theatre added to the atmosphere of the movie as there was a chandielier laying in the middle of the auditorium seats which apparently had fallen from the ceiling. There was a mysterious phantom figure in the balcony as well as something very strange behind the stage curtains. And no one could miss Red Death in the entrance lobby.

The theatre management dressed for the occasion as did multiple members of the audience.

Tim's mastery of the theatre organ was evident as he skillfully wove the music to match the tone, mood and tension of each scene in the movie as well as utilizing the special sound effects that only a theatre organ can provide.

The Kentucky Theatre held a special Christmas event on Saturday December 16th, 2023. They combined a Christmas Sing-A-Long with a showing of "It's a Wonderful Life" to create a truly wonderful evening.

The musical accompaniment was performed by Tim Jones on the Allen theatre organ and the songs were led by members of the Danville High School Advanced Choir which is directed by Dee Ann Gray.

The sing-a-long featured a mixture of songs which were guaranteed to bring out the Christmas spirit in everyone in attendance. As part of this special event patrons were also invited to enjoy a glass of eggnog or a holiday cocktail.

The audience came ready to sing and their energy matched the enthusiasm of the choir members leading the singing. Although there were a few eye rolls when the Twelve Days of Christmas started, everyone stayed with it.

With the warm atmosphere of the theatre, a classic movie and a fun sing-a-long, it was clearly a memorable evening.

The students who led the sing-a-long will be part of the Danville High School choir who will be taking their talents to the Big Apple in April of this year. They have been invited to perform at Carnegie Hall in New York City. This is a huge honor, and they are thrilled to represent Kentucky in this iconic music venue. To help with the costs of the trip, the Kentucky Theatre donated a portion of every ticket sold to the choir's travel fund.

The students will be in New York City April 10- April 14. Their performance at Carnegie Hall is on April 13th. They will be singing Elaine Hagenberg's work, "Illuminare". Elaine will be there for the performance. The conductor of this work will be UK professor Dr. Elizabeth Wilson. The choir has also been invited to sing with the Westminster Choir for the world premier of Dr. James Whitbourn's "Requiem Canticorum" under the direction of Dr. James Jordan.

The students are eager for the opportunity to perform at Carnegie Hall but it is also a bit overwhelming. "The students are a little nervous, the music is all in Latin," said Director Gray. "It is five songs along with an orchestra. We are going with Woodford County High School and Lexington Christian Academy. We are so excited, it is such a great opportunity for these kids from Danville to go to New York City. Many of them have never been."

#### BRIAN HUNT PERFORMS WITH LEXINGTON PHILHARMONIC ORCHESTRA

Although it happened a while ago, we would be remiss in not congratulating chapter member Brian Hunt on his performance with the Lexington Philharmonic on Feb 18th, 2023. Brian performed with the orchestra on the Singletary Center's 5/90 M.P. Moller organ for the last movement of Edward Elgar's "Enigma Variations". This was an exciting opportunity and Brian's performance was outstanding.

The Philharmonic was conducted by music director Melisse Brunet. The repertoire included: 1) ELLEN TAAFFE ZWILICH - Symphony No. 1: Three Movements for Orchestra, 2) BÉLA BARTÓK -

Viola Concerto (Serly Edition) Jordan Bak, viola and 3) EDWARD ELGAR - Enigma Variations which consists of fourteen variations on an original theme each representing one of Elgar's close friends.

The Moller is the largest pipe organ in Lexington. It was installed in Singletary Center in 1979 and received a new solid state console from Randall Dyer & Assoc in 1995.

the wood screws and dag screws on the bottom boards will all be refinished to their original state. Some of the components such as the magnet cores and the wiring to the magnets will need to be replaced as the originals are no longer viable.

Current status of the wind chests: The gaskets are installed on the top of the 3 rank chest and the threaded brass inserts have all been epoxied in. There are about half of the bottom gaskets remaining to punch out and then they'll be ready to glue on.

Tim has been making custom tools and jigs at all stages of this project to make the work go easier. In this case he has made a stand which will allow us to emboss the leather gaskets and then punch them out right next to the wind chest all at a good working height.

#### CONSOLE

The console has been professionaly restored and is in climate controlled storage waiting for the organ itself to be completed.

#### **RELAY**

The chapter has a Uniflex 4000 relay ready to be used. Once the organ is completed, this relay will need to have the appropriate wiring connections completed and the unit will need to be programmed to reflect the configuration of this organ.

#### **REGULATORS**

These have been professionally restored and are waiting for the remaining components of the organ to be completed.

#### **BLOWER/WIND LINES**

Work on these components has not yet started.

#### **PIPES**

The original pipes are in storage. They will need to be inspected to determine any restoration work that will be needed.

Working on the organ restoration is both a rewarding and a fun experience. The rewarding feeling comes from knowing that you are helping restore a historic Lexington treasure. While the work is meticulous, everyone on the project helps to make it a fun experience with the fellowship and camaradie that comes from being part of the team. You don't have to be an expert at restoration or even an organist to work on this project. Our project leader, Tim Jones, will explain and demonstrate each task as we need to perform it. # BLUEGRASS CHAPTER MEMBERS ATTEND "REMEMBER THE PARAMOUNT" CONCERT

Five members of the Bluegrass Chapter (Bill Johnson, Tim Jones, Brian Hunt, William Webber and Dana Ross) attended the nostalgic "Remember the Paramount" concert at the Hilbert Theater in Indianapolis on Sunday October 1st. The event was a musical salute to the Paramount Music Palace and its Mightly Wurlitzer featuring the original organists who played many of the favorite songs from the days when the Music Palace was one of the special places to be in Indianapolis.

The Paramount Music Palace was a restaurant on the southwest side of Indianapolis, IN where families came for the pizza but stayed to hear the Mightly 4/42 Wurlitzer organ. The Palace was a massive Art Deco



theatre building on Washington St. near the I-465 interchange which operated from 1979 to 1995. Although the official name was the "Paramount Music Palace Family Pizza Restaurant & Ice Cream Parlour", it wasn't about the food. Make no mistake, it was about the music flowing out of that Mighty Wurlitzer.

Each of the 'rock star' organists Donna Parker, Bill Vlasak, Ken Double and Dwight Thomas played their favorite memories individually and then they would combine to play duets on the organ and grand piano. Together they recreated the musical magic of the Paramount's Mighty Wurlitzer and brought back memories of the giant black and gold organ rising from the pit as bubbles ascended into the air. Close to a thousand people came to the concert to relive some of their favorite memories and experiences from the Music Palace be it birthdays, important life events or just get togethers with family and friends. It was also a memorable time for the organists themselves as there was so much history between each of them and the Palace itself.

Afterwards, many of the concert goers, the organists and members of the Central Indiana Chapter of the American Theatre Organ Society met for a reception at a local home in Indianapolis.


